#16 - William Castle - Butcher (Master) *a Shoemakers home in 1861

#15 - George Haigh - Tailor Journeyman

George & William Haigh (sons) - Tailor Journeymen

no # - Mary A. Ladd (widow age 64) - Lodging House Kent

Mary Ann Horais? (unmarried age 59) - Nurse *from London, Middlesex

#14 - Gibbon Ladd - Inn Keeper *from Whitechapel, Middlesex

Sarah Baldwin - House Servant

Richard Strand - House Servant *Caroline Strand is living here in 1861 (dressmaker)

(13, 12, 11?) - 13 - A Professor of Magic is living here in 1861

#10 - George Gambier - Builder / Master employing 7 men) *still here in 1861

George P. Gambier - Builder's Apprentice

#9 - John S. Hayward - Coach Builder (Master employing 8 men) - at number 5 in 1861

no # - Harriet Thunder (widow)

Ann Thunder (daughter age 12) - Parish Relief

Sarah Moore - Nurse Child age 3?

Palace Street *in 1778 it was referred to as Alphaba Street (a red pump stood on the junction of Palace street and Orange Street, previously known as the Prince of Orange Street.)

#27 (Red Pump) - Jack Holloway - Leather Seller / Foreman (employing 1 boy) *from Bucks (living at number 7 Orange street in 1861)

St. Peters Friars *later known as "The Friars"

#1 - Mary Hobday (widow) - Proprietor of Houses *still here in 1861

Susannah Emery - Dressmaker

Richard Solly - Retired Labourer (noted as retired Grazier in 1861)

#2 - Edward Barnes - Miller Journeyman (lived here in 41) *from Sussex

David Barnes - Baker

Robert Bourne - Formerly Porter at Union House

Richard Keates - Stone Mason Journeyman *from Camberwell, Surrey

William Perry - Copper Plate Printer Journeyman

#3 - Henry Bear - Coal Merchant (Master employing 2 men)

#4 - Joseph Hogken? - Carpenter Journeyman (A Hairdresser's in 1861)

Benjamin Pilshaw - Grocer's Assistant

#5 - John Terry - Green Grocer (James Webb is living here in 1861 - Dyer & General Dealer)

- #8 - Daniel Bowen - Mason Journeyman (unoccupied in 1861) *now an Art Gallery
Catherine Bowen - Seamstress

- #27 1/2 - Antonio Monti - General Dealer (employing 1 man) *from Italy... Still here in 1861 now a Jeweller & Watch Maker, etc.
Catherine McDonald - House keeper *from Southwark, Surrey
- #26 - Eliza Egglestone - House Keeper
Eliza Davis (servant) - Shop Keeper
Fanny Fagg - House Servant
- #25 - Thomas D. Saunders - Butcher (Master employing 1 man & 1 boy) *still a Butchers in 1861 - Young
John Acors - Journeyman Butcher
Tupsell? - House Servant
- #24 - John Featherstone - Grocer (Master) *was here in 1847, and still here in 1861, employing 1 boy
Annie Marsh - House Servant
- #23 - John Jackman - Tailor (Master employing 1 man) *from Lancashire *The house is now called the "Old Huguenot Weaver's House", and is an antique shop. John is still here in 1861 employing 4 men and 1 boy.
- #22 - William Prett - Pastry Cook (Master employing 1 boy) *Timber framed house (most properties on this side of Palace Street once belonged to Dutch and Huguenot weavers during the 16th century. *living at #26 in 1861

? Harris (son) - Guard to Coast

Sarah Blake (widow) - Charwoman
- Thomas Todd (son) - Ostler *someone employed in the stable to take care of the horses

- #5 - John Russell - Formerley Shoemaker *still here in 1861 noted as shoemaker
? Russell (son) - Sawyer

- #4 - Ann Filman? - no occupation
Thomas Filman? (son) - Labourer
- #3 - Edward Sherwood - Hawker* (Peddler) *still here in 1861 - General Hawker
George Rose (former son in law, widow) - Formerly Tanner
- #2 - Thomas Pay - Blacksmith Journeyman *a Tailor lives here in 1861
#1 - George Millener - Labourer
George Ward - Clock Maker Journeyman
1 house uninhabited

Palace Street

- #20 - Jane Pool - Tobacconist *a three story, timber framed with an early 19th century facade. Richard and Jane Pool are living here in 1861 - Richard is a Boot Maker
- Henry J. Hutchesson - Clergyman not having care of souls (*1861 Clerk, without care of Souls - Church of England)
Maria Holliday - House servant & Susan Kemp - House servant

St. Alphage Lane

- John Thornton - M.R.C.S. London, in general practice *Royal College of Surgeons *still here in 1861

#9 - Catherine Lording - Annuitant
Sarah Mungearm? - House servant
#8 - Thomas Moor - Retired Chief Officer in late E.J. Company? (abolished in 1836) in service and Captain of Steam Ship *from St. Marylebone, London - his wife Lydia is from the East Indies *still here in 1861
Drasson? Moor (son) - King's Scholar
Mary Ann Aiano? - House servant

Palace Street

#19 - Edward Pillow - Paper Hanger (Master) * The building is three stories and has fish scale tiles. There was a Victualler here in 1861 - Mr. Thomas Newmason?

Robert Rennie - Tea Dealer *Scotland
Alexander Rennie - Tea Dealer *Scotland

#18 - Moses Nathan - Glass, China, ?, etc. *a 17th century timber framed house on a very narrow plot of 11 feet
#17 - George Bates - Saddler (Master) of Sussex *Conquest House dates from the Norman Conquest. For a few hours this house was said to be the headquarters to the four knights who murdered Thomas a Becket in 1170.

#16 - Robert Leach - ? Auctioneer (Master) employing 1 man *Robert is still here in 1861 - Auctioneer & Appraiser (Listed as Furniture Broker, 16 Palace Street, 1847 Kent Gazetteer & Directory)

#15 - Henry Norton - Grocer & Tea Dealer (Master) employing 1 man *George Bates was here in 1847, Fishing Tackle Manufacturer (History Gazetteer & Directory of Kent Vol II, 1847)

Charlotte Graham - Midwife

Martha Ann Marsh - House servant

#14 - Pilcher Vincent - Chelsea Pensioner, Shoe Maker (Master) employing 2 men

Elizabeth Vincent - Shoe binder *Yorkshire

Stephen Gunner? - Farmers Labourer

Elizabeth Fairbrass - Housekeeper

#13 - William Finn? - Victualler *it is an 18th century building (The Albion Inn in 1861)

Mary Bedwell - House servant

#12 - Thomas Richard Barnes - Grocer (Master) *the building is 16th century, timber framed *was here in 1847, and still here 1861

Mary Dixon (visitor) - Annuitant

Sarah Master - House servant

#11 - Thomas Wells - Tailor (Master) employing 7 men *Northamptonshire *still here in 1861

Caroline Wickenden - House servant

#10 - John Bryson - Pork Butcher (Master) *became The Bell and Crown Inn in 1862

Frances Bedwell (widow) - Retired from Shoe Business

#9 - Stephen Ba(e)lsey? - Baker (Master) *still here in 1861

James Petman (servant) - Baker Foreman

#8 - Thomas Thurston - Upholsterer (Master) *the house is believed to have been built around 1250, possibly as the Rectors house of St. Alphage. (connects to St. Alphage church) some great pictures of the house at :

#7 - Jesse White - Clothier (Master) employing 4 men *timber framed building with three stories, inside the building is a finely moulded staircase and an 18th century embossed plasterwork on the ceiling.

Jesse White (son) - Tailor's apprentice *William F. White is here in 1861

Thomas White (son) - Baker's apprentice

#6 - George Francis - Plumber (Master) employing 1 man *number 6 is on the corner of Palace Street and Turn again Lane, it has an 18th century facade. Three stories high with a wooden modillion cornice. A succession of Italian families came to live here in the late 1800's *one of the Francis family lives here in 1861 - Plumber & Glazier

#5 - William Horsley - Butcher & Green Grocer

#4 - Matthias Heizman - [Clock Maker](#) *[Germany](#) *part of a single timber-framed building three stories, Matthias is still here in 1861

Joseph Heizman (brother) - [Clock Maker](#) *[Germany](#)

Elizabeth Nash (widow) - Retired Housekeeper

(4 Palace street was occupied by John W. Davey in 1847, he was a Fruiteer and Greengrocer *from History & Directory of Kent Vol II 1847)

#3 - John W. Davey - [Town Sergeant](#) *like the police chief, John is still living here in 1861 - Green Grocer & Town Sergeant
